This policy sets out the framework in which Pennington C of E Primary School will ensure that it actively promotes the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

These values are officially taught through the Religious Education (RE) and Personal Social and Health Education (PSHE) curriculum and are further nurtured through the school's ethos and promotion of spiritual, moral, social and cultural (SMSC) understanding.

1. Legal Framework

1.1. This policy will have consideration for the following guidance:

- Ofsted, School Inspection framework and Handbook, 2019.
- DfE, Promoting Fundamental British Values as part of SMSC in Schools, November 2014

1.2. This policy is carried out in conjunction with our following other policies:

2. Roles and Responsibilities

2.1. Pennington School understands the importance of promoting British values through a comprehensive and unprejudiced curriculum.

2.2. The Headteacher will ensure that all teachers and staff are aware of the requirement to uphold British values through the methods outlined in this policy, and will ensure that the appropriate procedures are in place to carry out these methods.

2.3. Teachers and support staff will ensure that their lessons are inclusive of, and sensitive to, the fundamental British values.

2.4. Pupils are expected to treat each other and staff with respect, in line with the school's Behaviour Policy.

3. Democracy

3.1. At Pennington School pupils have numerous opportunities to have their views heard through pupil questionnaires and the pupil-elected school council.

3.2. Our pupils are encouraged to have an input into what and how they learn to in an understanding of democracy for their future.

4. The Rule of Law

4.1. Pennington School has a high regard for the laws that govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. Our pupils are involved in the creation of school rules to inspire them with this understanding. School assemblies are used to promote these important messages.

4.2. At Pennington School pupils are taught these values and the reasons behind laws, whether they govern the class, the school or the country, that are

essential for their well-being and safety. Pupils are allowed healthy debate in class on the matter to encourage recognition of the importance of the law. Key Stage 2 learn about the national parliament and learn to engage in healthy debate through their own class and school councils.

4.3. Pennington School organises visits from authorities throughout the academic year in an effort to reinforce the reality and importance of this message.

5. Individual Liberty

5.1. At Pennington School we foster a safe and supportive environment where pupils are actively encouraged to make choices. Whether it is choosing a challenging task or an extra-curricular club, pupils have the freedom to base their choices on their interests.

5.2. Pupils are taught about their rights and personal freedoms and are encouraged and advised on how to exercise these safely, for instance through our teaching on e-safety and PSHE lessons.

6. Mutual Respect

6.1. Respect is at the heart of Pennington School's ethos. Pupils are treated with respect and learn to treat each other and staff with respect.

6.2. This is reinforced through our Behaviour Policy and is evident in the way staff and children treat each other.

7. Tolerance of those of different Faiths and Beliefs

7.1. At Pennington School we acknowledge that tolerance is achieved through pupils' knowledge and understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society and the opportunity for pupils to experience such diversity.

7.2. Throughout the year, collective worships are held focusing on equality, diversity, inclusion and bullying, with reference to prejudice based bullying, and discussion is encouraged. We hold a whole school anti-bullying week annually.

7.3. Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs is supported by the RE and PSHE curriculum.

7.4. We encourage our pupils from different faiths or religions to share their knowledge with their peers to enhance their learning.

8. Staff Training

8.1. At Pennington School staff are made aware of their responsibilities in terms of British values during their induction and annually in September INSET training through the Staff Handbook.

8.2. Staff will be offered the opportunity for further training on upholding the British Values Policy. All staff completed training through The National College in April 2024

9. Review

9.1. This policy will be reviewed yearly and amended as appropriate to reflect any changes to regulations.
